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School Values

As a school, we shape all that we do, to allow children to develop a strong sense of their Emotional, Spiritual and Cultural self through our Christian values:

- **Honesty**
- **Forgiveness**
- **Courage**
- **Hope**
- **Community**

We ensure that children are prepared for future life and have the Cultural Capital to be active citizens of the world they live in. Through all work in school children are supported in developing an understanding of their place in the world. Our collective Christian values shape our thinking and aim to promote the positive Physical, Emotional, Mental and Spiritual development of our community.

Safeguarding

The Governing Body and staff of Harewood C of E Primary School take as our first priority the responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of our pupils, to minimise risk and to work together with other agencies to ensure rigorous arrangements are in place within our school to identify, assess, and support those children who are suffering harm and to keep them safe and secure whilst in our care.

Equal Opportunities

We have a clear duty under the Equality Act 2010 to ensure that our teaching is accessible to all pupils, including those who are lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT). Our inclusive curriculum will foster good relations between pupils, tackle all types of prejudice, including homophobia, and promote understanding and respect, enabling us to meet the requirements, and live the intended spirit, of the Equality Act 2010.

Policy Statement

At Harewood C of E Primary School, the daily act of collective worship is viewed as a central part of school life. Through this and in the general ethos of the school we seek to promote our aim of developing all aspects of every child, including their spiritual awareness, so that they can become the confident, rounded individuals they were created to be.

Our acts of collective worship are times where we come together to share our love of God, learn more about faith and celebrate our achievements (and sometimes failures) together. The worship of the school is based on promoting the Christian values which permeate the ethos of the school. As such, the contributions of staff, pupils, church clergy and other visitors are valued highly.

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We blend Christian teaching and values education in order to create opportunities for children to develop physically, emotionally, personally, socially, mentally and intelligently so that their self-esteem and well-being is sound and supported by ever growing emotional intelligence, leading to an understanding of their rights and responsibilities as young citizens. The introduction of common values allows children to access moral and ethical thought. We also actively seek to encourage the attitudes of awe, wonder and reflection.

As a Church of England Primary school we see our collective worship as an integral and important part of school life. Our collective worship policy fulfils the statutory requirements common to all schools according to the 1998 Education Reform Act (consolidated in the 1996 Education Act). It also fulfils the Diocesan requirements for a voluntary controlled church school which states that worship will be Christian in content with an Anglican emphasis.

Aims

Our aim is that our worship contributes to the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of all children and staff. Providing a daily act of worship for all pupils enables them to:

- Worship God
- Reflect on the Christian values of the school
- Learn about and celebrate multi faith festivals
- Reflect upon their own personal values and development
- Develop a community spirit and common ethos of shared values
- Consider moral and spiritual issues
- Respond in a personal way to the worship offered
- Experience stillness, quiet and reflection
- Experience a variety of forms of prayer and meditation including praise, seeking forgiveness and quiet reflection
- Begin to understand the nature and purpose of worship
- Develop an understanding of the Christian liturgical calendar

Collective worship at Harewood, whether in assembly or in class time will:

- Be inspiring and transformational
- Be led by senior leaders, staff, children, clergy and visitors
- Focus on the school Christian values and ethos and develop the Christian vision of the school
- Include a range of creative opportunities for developing drama and music
- Involve pupils making a contribution to worship by leading on different themes during the week
- Celebrate and give thanks for the achievements within school, local and international community, and occasions of significance, including festivals
- Provide a foundation for a mature understanding and practice of worship in the future
- Be respectful of the right of parents to withdraw their child from the collective worship content of the daily worship.

Organisation and Content of Daily Worship

As a Church of England school the content of our worship is organised to:

- Follow the Christian liturgical calendar and cover all the major Christian festivals including Harvest, Christmas, Easter and Pentecost
- Follow a half-termly theme on a 2 year cycle to cover the school Christian values

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- Be rooted in biblical teaching
- Use the Lord's Prayer and the school prayer as well as a range of other prayers as appropriate including ones written by the pupils

Collective worship will be presented in a variety of styles and to include music, story, drama, and singing, reflection and reverence in prayer time but will include the following stages:

- Gathering
- Engaging
- Responding
- Sending

Worship can take place in the school hall, the classroom or in an outdoor area as appropriate and usually lasts for 15 minutes. Special services and celebrations will take longer. There are a range of resources available in school to support the planning of collective worship. A candle is lit and a welcome blessing is said to give a distinctive start to collective worship. Collective worship at Harewood is invitational and children can choose to make the prayers their own by saying Amen at the end. If they choose not to do this is entirely acceptable but they are expected to treat the act of prayer with respect. A time of quiet for reflection is a regular part of our collective worship. The highest standard of behaviour is expected during collective worship from all involved.

Our Celebration Assembly, usually on Fridays, is as much an act of worship as any others through the week. In it we come together before God to celebrate the achievements of the children and reaffirm the value of each member of our school family.

Special Services

Each year the school specifically celebrates key events in the Christian calendar through worship. These include the Harvest Festival, the Christmas Carol Service and the Easter Breakfast. At the end of the school year there is also our Thanksgiving Service, held at All Saints Church on the Harewood Estate (by permission of the Estate and the Churches Conservation Trust), to give thanks to God for the academic year past. On the last day of each school year there is the final assembly, at which we give thanks for the contribution those leaving the school have made.

Other Aspects of Worship

As part of our overall life of worship, each class will say a chosen prayer at the end of each day. Each class will also say a grace before leaving the classroom to go down for lunch. As with prayers during acts of worship, children will be encouraged to participate but will be allowed to choose not to as long as they treat the act of prayer by others with respect.

Inclusion and withdrawal

Collective worship is central to the life of the school. However, parents do have a legal right to withdraw their children from all or part of worship. Before making the decision to exercise that right, parents are encouraged to discuss the issue with the Head teacher. Staff also have the right to withdraw on grounds of conscience, but we hope that all staff will feel able to support the Christian ethos of the school and participate in collective worship.

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Monitoring, Evaluation and Review

The governing body will review this policy to assess its implementation and effectiveness. The policy will be promoted and implemented through the school linked documents - R.E. policy
