sea water

Scientists in Japan have created a new

kind of plastic that can completely

dissolve in seawater in just two to three

hours. Unlike most biodegradable plastics

that leave behind harmful microplastics,

this one breaks down without a trace. The

special material is strong and flexible, but

disappears quickly in salty water and

even in soil. Experts hope it could help

reduce plastic pollution in the future,

especially in packaging.
